Learning at St Mary's

As the oldest continuously running girls' school in South Australia, St Mary's College seeks to inspire young women to pursue individual pathways and challenge boundaries.

Three critical values of community, justice and growth shape all aspects of College life. Our teaching and learning program encompasses these values through innovative curriculum and creative lesson design.

Curriculum Foundations and Underpinnings

The educational landscape is continually changing at National, State and Sector levels. As such, St Mary's College continues to embrace a variety of curriculum opportunities and re-imagine them in our dynamic teaching environment in order to produce the best outcomes and opportunities for students. At the forefront of these changes is the Australian Curriculum:

The Australian Curriculum describes the entitlement of students as a foundation for their future learning, growth and active participation in the Australian community. The Australian Curriculum informs both what we teach and how we approach curriculum from Reception to Year 10 in Arts, Health and Physical Education, History, Humanities and Social Sciences, English, Languages, Mathematics, Science and Technologies.

Our Religious Education program from Reception to Year 12 is based on the Crossways Framework, which has been developed by Catholic Education South Australia (CESA). Our cross-curriculum, teaching practices are also informed by The Child Protection Curriculum and the Made in the Image of God (MITIOG) Framework; initiatives at Federal and Sector levels respectively, which support students in learning about themselves and their world through a variety of approaches.

Teachers plan diverse learning experiences from these frameworks to develop creativity, collaboration and critical

thinking. This learning journey is further developed as students transition into the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) in Year 11 and 12. Our aim is to prepare young women with the skills to make informed decisions about their learning pathway beyond school.

St Mary's College is committed to reviewing and renewing assessment practices in line with the opportunities inherent in the Australian Curriculum and SACE, while embracing the educational goals promoted by the Alice Springs (Mparntwe) Education Declaration. These goals underpin the development of students as:

"...successful learners, confident and creative individuals, and active and informed citizens."

General Capabilities

At St Mary's College, the General Capabilities are addressed through the content of each learning area. They are developed and applied in the classroom to enrich student learning.

Literacy

- Develop knowledge and key skills to interpret and use language confidently for learning and communication.
- Involves listening, viewing, speaking, writing and creating oral, print and digital texts for a range of purposes.
- Literacy encompasses a student's ability to understand, analyse and evaluate information, make meaning, express thoughts and emotions, present ideas and opinions, interact with others and participate in a range of activities.

Numeracy

- Develop knowledge and skills to use mathematics confidently.
- Recognising and understanding the role of mathematics in the world, in particular, the interconnectedness of mathematical knowledge with other learning areas and the wider world.

Information Communication and Technology (ICT)

- Learning to use ICT effectively and appropriately access, create and communicate information and ideas, solve problems and work collaboratively in all learning areas.
- Using digital technologies to their full potential and adapting new ways of doing things as technology evolves.
- Transform the way students think whilst giving them greater control over how they learn.
- Conducting research, creating multimodal information products, analysing data, designing solutions to problems, controlling processes and devices, and supporting computation while working in collaboration with others.

Critical and Creative Thinking

- Learning to generate and evaluate knowledge, clarify concepts and ideas, seek possibilities, consider alternatives and solve problems.
- Using reason, logic, resourcefulness, imagination and innovation in all learning areas.

- Engage in complex issues and learning to navigate a world of competing rights, values, interests and norms.

- Stimulate students’ interests in the lives of others whilst cultivating values central to curiosity, care, empathy, reciprocity, respect and responsibility.
- Make connections to their own world and others, whilst engaging with diverse cultures in ways which recognise commonalities, differences and create connections with others.



Wellbeing, Relationships, Agency and Personal Responsibility (WRAP)

Our Reception to Year 12 WRAP program explicitly teaches social and emotional wellbeing. It focuses on teaching personal and social capabilities, safety, social skills, empathy and building respectful relationships with others. WRAP covers complex topics in an age-appropriate way through weekly timetabled lessons.

Our program is enriched by a strong research base about the developmental needs of young women. Parent sessions and resources support families to reinforce this learning at home.

WRAP occurs every Wednesday afternoon from Reception to Year 12.

- WRAP is designed to meet the needs of girls and young women in a complex and changing world.
- WRAP is evidence informed, using data from our students to review and shape the program.
- WRAP is shaped by research. Firstly, about the skills

young women need to navigate their world. Secondly, by contemporary wellbeing literature.

- WRAP nurtures and develops social and emotional wellbeing.
- WRAP strengthens our students’ capacity for learning in all areas.
- WRAP develops the social and emotional learning competencies: self-awareness, social awareness, self-management, relationship skills, responsible decision making.
- WRAP explicitly teaches skills such as personal safety, empathy, cyber safety, setting personal boundaries and building respectful relationships with others.
- WRAP incorporates the explicit teaching of the Child Protection Curriculum along with diverse, age appropriate Social-Emotional Learning Programs.
- WRAP is delivered through a collaborative approach utilising industry experts, professional guest speakers, and the expertise of our wellbeing team.

Approach to Learning in the Middle School

Our student-centred differentiated curriculum aims to reach all learners through a variety of resources, teaching methodologies and innovative uses of technology. Allowing each student to develop a sense of achievement drives all learning design. St Mary's College understands that all students learn differently. Recognising that Middle School provides a space for developing confidence, learning is about inquiry, problem solving, experiencing collaboration, and seeing challenges as moments for growth. Building these interpersonal skills and strategies prepares our students for their transition to the Senior School.

The Year 7 to Year 9 curriculum is comprised of learning activities and assessment items using the Achievement Standards in the Australian Curriculum, and is planned and assessed using a mix of the Content Descriptors, General Capabilities and Cross Curriculum Priorities.

Year 7 students experience a full foundation curriculum, whilst students in Year 8 and 9 have some subject choices.

English

The English Learning Area provides students with opportunities to develop the literacy, communication, and critical thinking skills needed to succeed in education, employment, and everyday life. Learning is designed to be purposeful and engaging, encouraging students to explore a wide range of texts while developing their ability to interpret, analyse, create, and communicate ideas effectively. Through reading, writing, speaking, listening, and viewing, students learn to think critically about language and how it shapes meaning, perspectives, and understanding.

Students are encouraged to become thoughtful and independent communicators by responding to authentic audiences and purposes across a variety of contexts. They develop confidence in expressing their ideas clearly and creatively while refining their ability to adapt language, structure, and style to suit different text forms. Through drafting, feedback, and reflection, students strengthen their writing and communication skills while building resilience and confidence as learners.

Across the Learning Area, students develop important transferable skills including communication, critical

and creative thinking, collaboration, organisation, and digital literacy. They learn to evaluate information, construct arguments, appreciate different perspectives, and communicate effectively in both individual and collaborative settings. These skills are highly valued across all industries and further study pathways, reflecting the strong literacy and communication skills required in an increasingly complex and interconnected world.

The English Learning Area encourages students to become reflective, empathetic, and confident communicators who can engage thoughtfully with a range of ideas, cultures, and perspectives. It provides strong foundations for further study, training, and employment while preparing students to participate actively and responsibly in their communities and an evolving global society.

Course Description

The Year 8 English course engage with a wide range of texts as they build both their creative and analytical skills. They explore the human experience through novels, film, short stories, drama and other media texts.

Students build a depth of understanding in the role that audience, purpose and form has when creating and analysing a range of texts. Weekly literacy lessons are used to build depth in the skills students need within the subject area. The focus of these lessons is on core reading skills including interpreting information from a text and inferencing.

Humanities and Social Sciences

The Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS) Learning Area enables students to develop an understanding of the people, events, places, and systems that have shaped societies throughout history and continue to influence the contemporary world. Through their studies of the Humanities, students investigate significant issues, examine evidence, and explore how individuals and communities respond to challenges and opportunities across different times and places.

Central to HASS learning is the development of inquiry and research skills. Students learn to formulate questions, locate and evaluate information, interpret a range of sources, and draw evidence-based conclusions. By engaging with diverse perspectives and experiences, they develop the capacity to think critically, communicate effectively, and make informed decisions about issues that affect individuals and communities.

Learning experiences within the HASS foster a broad range of transferable skills that support success both

within and beyond the classroom. Students strengthen their abilities of analysis, problem-solving, collaboration, communication, and digital literacy while developing confidence in presenting ideas and justifying viewpoints. These capabilities are highly valued in further study, employment, and active participation in society.

An important outcome of the HASS Learning Area is the development of informed, reflective, and active citizens who understand their role within local, national, and global communities. By examining the relationships between people, places, economies, governments, and environments, students gain a deeper appreciation of the complexities of the modern world, equipping them to contribute thoughtfully, responsibly, and positively to society.

Course Description
Students engage in a number of depth studies drawn from the disciplines of Geography, History, Civics and Citizenship and Economics and Business. Inspired from the Australian Curriculum topics, like Migration, Landscapes and Landforms, the Medieval World and Democracy will be covered. Students develop their knowledge and skills through participation in a range of activities including source analysis, group work, class discussion and research-based projects. ICT is used to support student learning and engagement with contemporary and historical sources.

Course Description

Students engage in learning from multiple disciplines: History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, and Economics and Business. Knowledge and skills from these areas are integrated into a number of depth studies. Students explore topics from the Australian Curriculum, such as the impact of the Industrial Revolution on people and places both at the time and in the long term. They also learn about the people and movements that led to the Federation of Australia and how this impacts the way Australia is governed today. They examine a range of primary and secondary sources to build a deep understanding of Australia's involvement in World War I. Students also explore the topic of sustainable tourism.

Health and Physical Education

The Health and Physical Education Learning Area equips students with the knowledge, understanding and skills to make informed decisions about their own and others' health, safety, and wellbeing. Learning experiences integrate practical participation with theoretical concepts, enabling students to engage in authentic, real-world contexts.

Students explore a range of topics including personal and community health, movement and performance, leadership, collaboration, risk management, and decision-making. Through inquiry-based learning, they analyse, interpret, and evaluate data to develop meaning from their experiences and identify strategies for improvement.

Students develop critical and creative thinking by analysing situations, evaluating evidence, solving problems, and generating innovative strategies for improving health and performance outcomes. Personal and social capabilities are strengthened through opportunities to work both independently and collaboratively, demonstrating resilience, empathy, self-management, and effective communication in a

variety of group and performance settings. Students explore topics with ethical understanding examining issues related to fairness, inclusion, respect, safety, and responsibility in both individual and team contexts. They learn to consider diverse perspectives, reflect on moral and ethical dimensions of health-related decisions, and apply this understanding to real-world scenarios.

Students build their literacy skills by communicating effectively using subject-specific terminology, engaging in self-reflection, and identifying areas for growth. Leadership is developed through opportunities to work both independently and collaboratively with others.

The Health and Physical Education Learning Area supports students to develop the knowledge, skills, and confidence to lead active, healthy, and balanced lives, while providing a strong foundation for further study and career pathways in the health, fitness, and wellbeing industries.

Course Description

This practical course emphasises the importance of living an active life and extending a student's range of motor skills. Students are given opportunities to be involved in recreational activities that use both College and community resources and that cater for varying interests. Science is the systematic pursuit of knowledge about the physical and natural world. It is driven by curiosity and the excitement of discovery via observation, research, and experimentation. Science empowers students to make informed decisions and build a better future.

Within all subjects in the Science Learning Area, students experience science as both a body of knowledge and a process through which that knowledge is developed and refined. Learning in science is designed to be fun, as it provides students with the thrill of discovering how the world works and the satisfaction of solving real-world problems.

The study of science sharpens students' critical thinking, logical reasoning, and problem-solving abilities; skills which are vital in all aspects of life. Students develop an understanding of scientific concepts by making observations, forming hypotheses, collecting

and interpreting data, and drawing evidence-based conclusions. Students are provided with opportunities to express creativity and innovation by designing investigations, generating solutions, and applying scientific understanding to real-world challenges. These opportunities also foster their ability to collaborate, communicate effectively, and make informed decisions.

Science in the Middle School allows students to study subjects from a range of scientific disciplines, including both the natural and social sciences. The natural sciences explore life, organisms, matter, and energy through the topics of Biology, Chemistry, and Physics. The social sciences investigate human behaviour and the relationships between individuals through the study of Psychology.

Course Description

The Year 7 Science program develops students' understanding of the world through the three strands of the Australian Curriculum: Science Understanding, Science as a Human Endeavour and Science Inquiry Skills. Students build knowledge and skills that help them form a scientific view of the world.

They explore how biological diversity is ordered and organised, and represent flows of matter and energy in ecosystems. They model the cycles of the Earth–Sun– Moon system and explain how these cycles influence phenomena on Earth. Using particle theory, they investigate the physical properties of substances. Robotics is integrated into their study of simple machines to support hands-on learning. Students also examine how scientific responses are developed and how science impacts society.
