# THE GOLDEN THREAD OF OUR PAST AND FUTURE

The oldest continuously running school for girls in South Australia, St Mary's College Adelaide was established on 2 February 1869, following the arrival in Adelaide from Dublin, Ireland, of seven Dominican Sisters. The determination and commitment of our founding sisters, to the critical importance of educating girls and young women, lives in the fabric of our school.

At the request of the Dominican Sisters of North Adelaide, the Dominican Sisters of Eastern Australia, and the Holy Cross Congregation of Dominican Sisters in Adelaide, Dominican Education Australia was established by the Catholic Church on 28 January 2015. It was formed to ensure the ongoing provision of education inspired by the Dominican charism.

Today as one of the education ministries of Dominican Education Australia (DEA), our Dominican spirit inspires us to be seekers of truth, to be daring and courageous, open-minded and to hold an unwavering commitment to inclusivity and welcome.

Our approach to learning is contemporary and innovative. We challenge and support our students to excel, offering a range of diverse pathways and opportunities for all learners. Learning happens within and beyond the classroom. We network and connect with all the opportunities our city location has to offer.

Our restorative culture is at the heart of all that we are and all that we do. St Mary's College is a place where relationships come first.

We develop leadership in diverse ways. We engage critically with the issues and concerns of our times within and beyond the school gates. We nurture the growth of strong women equipped to find their voice and their place in the world.



# OUR CHALLENGE: AGENCY, FUTURE READY, INCLUSIVE

Schools are a microcosm of society. As the world becomes more complex, so too does the work of schools in supporting the learning and wellbeing of students. Being in the business of empowering young women, means we are not educating for compliance. Students must have agency in their learning.

Enabling all students to excel in learning and in life means that we offer a rich curriculum and diverse ways of responding to the wellbeing needs of girls and young women. St Mary's strength lies in the multitude of pathways it offers, meaning there is something for all learners irrespective of where their passion and interests lie. To be true to our intention to equip our students to be future ready, we must continue to effectively nurture the learning growth of all students, to understand our impact as educators and to plan targeted intervention for students who are at risk.

At its heart, restorative justice values relationships. It nurtures the dignity of the human person and moves away from shame and punishment as tools to manage and control behaviour. A restorative approach recognises that being in relationship requires the investment of all parties, it can be challenging, and issues need to be worked through with those involved. Lived well in a school community, it invites us into deep dialogue about how we shape our work with parents, staff and students in every facet of the life of the college. It requires the personal growth and development of the adults in the community. In fact, it demands that we start here, to support the growth and flourishing of the students in our care.

As our student cohort becomes more religiously and culturally diverse; as the learning and behaviour support needs of our students shift; we need to be more overtly attentive to inclusivity and welcome.

To live our values of truth, justice and community, we must ensure that our past students know they will always have a place at St Mary's long after they have left our gates. In turn, the student cohort of today and tomorrow, can benefit from the extended network of skill, experience, knowledge and wisdom of Old Scholars and feel supported through the global family of Dominican women.

Each day, our students and families can see the opportunities that lie before them as a St Mary's College student.

- Create a culture of excellence characterised by learning growth for all students and evidence informed continuous improvement
- Design learning programs tailored to the educational needs of girls at each stage of their schooling; growing their confidence and capacity to excel in a range of fields
- Remain agile and responsive to educational change creating innovative programs that develop students within and beyond the classroom
- Support teaching excellence through investment in professional formation that builds collaboration and strong cultures of feedback, coaching and reflection
- Grow student agency by giving them the language to understand themselves as learners and have an active voice in their learning and wellbeing development
